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Clinical Placements

The Rankin School of Nursing Placement team handles the assignment of clinical placements for students, which can occur in various locations beyond the primary area of Antigonish. Students are responsible for their own transportation and any costs associated with travel or accommodation, if necessary. There is no guarantee that a student's clinical placement will be in their preferred location.

There are two types of placements within the program:

- **Group Clinical Placements** (NURS 234, NURS 309, NURS 334): Groups of students are led by a designated StFX Nurse Educator. Students will experience clinical rotations within LTC, Acute Care, OBS, and Mental Health. These placements are arranged within Antigonish, New Glasgow, and surrounding areas.
- **Preceptored Clinical Placements** (NURS 409 and NURS 440): In these full-time placements, students work one-on-one following the schedule of a designated RN Preceptor. These placements occur across the province. The Clinical Placement Coordinator for your program will request students to submit preceptorship location preferences for consideration.

Coordinating clinical placements involves several complexities, including securing preceptors and placement locations. As a result, the exact details—such as dates, shift times, and locations—may not be confirmed until closer to the anticipated start date.

Mandatory Pre-Clinical Document Requirements

To participate in clinical practice, students must complete several mandatory pre-clinical requirements. The Rankin School of Nursing sends students a Welcome letter which includes pre-clinical forms outlining the requirements. It is strongly encouraged that students maintain their own personal health record by keeping copies of all documentation. Immunization documentation must be submitted as a complete package. Partially completed documentation will not be accepted. The following requirements are mandatory for entrance into clinical practice:

- Vulnerable Sector & Criminal Record Check (Local Police Department or RCMP Detachment)
- NS Child Abuse Registry NS Child Abuse Register
- Health Science Placement Network Consent Form
- First Aid for semester 3 and CPR Health Care Provider course (yearly)
 - o Note: CPR must be updated annually, and proof of recertification will be placed on your file
- NSHA Student Immunization Record Must be completed and signed by a Health Professional
 - Note: Confirmation of childhood immunizations can be obtained from Provincial Department of Health or Family Physician

Additional Mandatory Preplacement Requirements

These requirements will be assigned to you for completion prior to the start of your first clinical placement:

- NSHA Student/Learner Placement Agreement
- NSHA Pledge of Confidentiality (annually)
- NSHA LMS eLearning Orientation Modules (annually)

Ensure all documentation is complete and submitted by specified deadlines to facilitate a smooth transition into your clinical placements.

Submitting Pre-Placement Requirements

The Placement Coordinator is required to submit confirmation of pre-placement requirements on behalf of students to NSHA one month before the scheduled placement start date. To ensure timely submission, students must provide all necessary pre-placement documents by the dates specified below:

- Bachelor of Science in Nursing (4-year program) [BScN 4-years]: November 15th of semester 3
- BScN Accelerated Option (2-year program) [BScN AO 2-years]: March 15th of semester 3
- Bachelor of Science in Nursing for LPNs [BScN for LPNs]: July 15th of semester 4A

A Few Key Points to Keep in Mind

- **Pre-Placement Requirements:** Documentation can take several weeks to several months to complete, especially if requiring vaccinations. Be sure to begin working on your pre-clinical documents early.
- **Timing & Flexibility**: While the coordinator can provide a general timeline, the specific details of your clinical placement may not be finalized until shortly before it starts. Be prepared for last-minute updates or changes.
- Family and Professional Responsibilities: The placement team is aware that some students have competing responsibilities, such as family and work commitments. They're working to finalize placements as quickly as possible, but external factors (like availability of preceptors or shifts in hospital needs) can sometimes cause delays.
- Travel & Accommodation:
 - a. Students are responsible for travel costs to their clinical placements and potential short-term accommodation if the placement is far from their home.
 - b. For Distance LPN-BScN students completing placements in the Antigonish/New Glasgow area during the Spring term (May-July), there is a special accommodation rate available to stay on campus.

Extenuating Circumstances

If you have an extenuating circumstance that may impact your ability to attend clinical placements, please contact the Coordinator of Student Affairs at the Rankin School of Nursing. They can provide guidance and support to address your situation.

How to Get Ready for Clinical Practicums

Preparing for clinical placements involves adhering to the Rankin School of Nursing's Professional Appearance Policy, which outlines specific guidelines for uniforms and required equipment. The School of Nursing Policy on Professional Appearance is found at RSoN Regulations & Policies. By adhering to these guidelines, you ensure a professional appearance that aligns with the standards of the Rankin School of Nursing.

Your Student Account Access

After you have been accepted **and** confirmed into the program, you will receive a confirmation letter from the Admissions Office which will include your login information for accessing your StFX email, as well as University databases, such as myData and Banner Self-Service.

Your StFX student email account is used for all communication between you and StFX. All information coming from the School of Nursing, as well as other University offices, will be sent to your StFX email account only. It is vital that you check and maintain your account regularly.

Activating your StFX email account

Accessing MyData & Banner Self-Service

MyData and Banner Self-Service are databases in which you can check your grades, your course registrations, and your financial account.

- 3. For **Banner Self-Service** log in using your **StFX Student Number and 6 Digit PIN** this is where you can verify/view your registration dates/times and grades.
- 4. For **MyData** log in using your **StFX Username and Password** this is where you can view your financial account.

Registration & Withdrawal

Course calendars for BScN students 4-year and 2-year programs are posted on the Registrar's website at Academic Calendar and the LPN-BScN program is posted Step Centre for Online Learning & Professional Studies (Fall/Winter and Spring/Summer) and contain all the information needed for course registration.

Important Note:

- The Rankin SON office registers BScN (4-year) and BScN AO (2-year) students into <u>all</u> their courses.
- The StFX Online Learning & Professional Studies Program Office registers LPN-BScN students into <u>all</u> their courses.

Course Withdrawals & Refunds

It is important to observe the formalities of withdrawing from a course to avoid academic penalty. Without proper notification, a student remains on the official class and program lists. Thus, absence from exams and other requirements will result in a failure on the student's university transcript. StFX Online Refund Policy Link.

Deferrals

If you have been accepted into the LPN to BScN Pathway Program, you **will not** be able to defer your acceptance. You will need to reapply for the next admission cycle.

Academic Regulations

Academic regulations outlined in this handbook briefly introduce information contained in the StFX Academic Calendar. For more detailed information, refer to the current <u>Academic Calendar</u>. In some areas, regulations have been adapted to meet the needs, requirements, and circumstances of the distance learning experience. In the case of dispute or misunderstanding, the Academic Calendar serves as the official reference.

Academic Standing

Students in the BScN Program **must** receive a grade of **at least 65%** for successful completion of each nursing course. The passing grade for non-nursing courses in the BScN Program is **50%**.

Advancement & Graduation Requirements

Progression requirements for the BScN program are outlined in the following table:

Course Failure

Any course failure, most particularly a failure in any of the required nursing courses, greatly jeopardizes a student's chance of successfully completing the program of study. A failure results in the student being placed on academic probation. Two failures, academic suspension. Additional failures will result in the student's dismissal from the program.

It may be possible for a student to repeat a failed course pending approval from the Associate Dean. In this case, the repeated course would be taken in conjunction with the next course on the schedule. Credit for the next course would be granted only if a minimum grade of 65% is achieved in the repeated course.

There is no guarantee that repeat courses will be approved/provided in any program of study. However, depending upon the individual circumstance, the Associate Dean will make every effort to provide an opportunity for the student to repeat the course in a following session but at the student's expense.

Final Grade Appeals

Please read the section on appeals for assignments and final grades through the most current edition of the <u>Academic Calendar</u>. If students choose to appeal a grade the application is located at <u>Appeal a Grade</u>.

Academic Misconduct

All StFX students are expected to maintain the highest academic integrity. It is important to be aware of the penalties for plagiarism and the use of unauthorized aids in assignments or examinations as outlined in the Academic Calendar.

Students are expected to be familiar with university policies regarding academic dishonesty. If you are unsure whether or not you need to cite a reference in a written paper, post, etc., please cite it! Material taken from others for responses, presentations, and papers must be acknowledged. **Failure to follow this practice may result in a grade of 0.**

Graduation

Application to Graduate

Students in their graduation year **MUST** apply to be considered a candidate for the applicable convocation ceremony, even if you will not be attending the ceremony. Applications to apply for convocation can be located through Banner Self-Service. There are no fees associated with this application.

It is important to note that **no student** will be considered a candidate for any convocation ceremony without an application. The application form is submitted electronically to the StFX Registrar's Office. The Office of the Registrar will maintain the candidacy list for both convocation ceremonies (Fall and Spring). Graduation & Licensing Information

Once a nursing student has been confirmed as eligible to graduate with their BScN degree, their name is sent to the Nova Scotia College of Nursing (NSCN) by Dr. Amy Hallaran, Associate Dean, Rankin School of Nursing. Information for registering with NSCN can be found at NSCN - First Time Registering in Nova Scotia.

If you plan to register in another province or country, you should contact the specific nursing licensing body to determine the steps for beginning their process.

RN Licensure

Nursing graduates apply to the Nova Scotia College of Nurses (NSCN) to write the licensure exam The Next Generation NCLEX (NGN) to become Registered Nurses (RNs) following graduation with their BScN degree.

Students have extensive opportunity to prepare for NCLEX-style testing throughout the program with a software package, HESI by Elsevier Publishing, which features realistic nursing case studies and NGN style questions to practice problem-solving and enhance clinical judgment. Additional information about NCLEX and RN licensure can be found on the NSCN website NCLEX - RN Exam.



Appendix A - Additional Program Costs

There are costs associated with the nursing program beyond university tuition and fees. The following provides general estimates for budgeting purposes as the actual costs may fluctuate depending on vendor pricing. **All estimates are in Canadian dollars unless otherwise indicated.** These additional costs are collected in various ways throughout the program depending on the item.

- 1. **Textbooks**: Textbooks for health disciplines can be expensive as they are frequently updated due to changing knowledge. It is not wise to purchase used books until each course professor designates course texts.
- 2. **CNSA/Photocopy Fee (\$30)** *: Annual membership fee for the Canadian Student Nurses Association (CSNA) (\$15) and annual student-related printing costs (\$15) are combined in a single fee
- 3. **Nursing Starter Packages (approx. \$600):** The StFX Nursing Society will manage orders for your nursing uniform, stethoscope, and blood pressure cuff. You will also need a pair of white or dark sneakers or nursing shoes to wear **exclusively** in practice settings. NOTE, for students in the LPN to BScN program, you will require badges only. The cost of badges is \$10.
- 4. **Nametags (\$10)** *: Student name tags are to be worn on your uniform. Nametag purchases are arranged by staff within the school.
- 5. First Aid & CPR Certification: approximately \$130
- 6. **TB Testing:** approximately \$40-\$100
- 7. Criminal Record Check: free if picked up in Antigonish \$0-\$30
- 8. NS Child Abuse Registry Check: free no matter location
- 9. **CPR Re-certification:** approximately \$85 (3rd & 4th year students)
- 10. In-program HESI package (approximately \$500) *: Once you have graduated from the nursing program, you will be required by Canadian provincial-territorial nursing regulatory organizations to pass a professional licensure examination (NCLEX-RN©). The three nursing programs in NS have integrated an online Health Educations Systems Incorporated (HESI) package into our respective programs to support student learning and readiness for the NCLEX-RN© exam. This package will be available to you in Semester 5 and used throughout the balance of your program.
- 11. **Clinical:** Due to placements occurring throughout the province of Nova Scotia, you may incur additional travel and accommodation costs.

Appendix B – Curriculum Framework: A Wheel of Change

The framework represents the curriculum in constant motion as it adapts to student learners' needs and voices and responds to expected and unexpected changes that arise from the interaction between complex spheres of influence represented around the outer rim (refer to Diagram 1). Adaptive evaluative processes influence curriculum changes with input from internal and external partners in academia, health systems, communities, and governing bodies. Current research, policies and anti-racism and anti-oppression practices also inform ongoing quality improvement.




Diagram 1: A Wheel of Change

There are four interrelated course concentrations within the curriculum: "The Discipline and Professional Practice", "The Art and Science of Health and Nursing", "Supporting Health" and "Integrating Nursing Roles and Practice" (refer to Appendix A for the course concentration chart). Courses are divided among these four concentrated areas of study within each semester. These course concentrations have associated themes represented with colored wedges in the framework (refer to Diagram 1). Each theme has related concepts and Nova Scotia College of Nurses (NSCN) entry level competencies (ELCs) (refer to Appendix B for theme and concept definitions and ELCs) which are captured in associated courses, teaching and learning activities, and evaluative criteria. Although related concepts and ELCs appear under specific curriculum themes, they more interrelated than exclusive.

At the center of the wheel are student learners from varied backgrounds who actively contribute to new understandings as a means of "seeing one another" within the curriculum. The grey-purple hub represents graduate outcomes, consistent with the ELCs. Collaborative partnerships between students, faculty, nurse educators, preceptors, intra-inter professional health care teams, patients, families, and communities are imperative for student achievement of these graduate outcomes. The black triangles at the centre represent the SON teaching and learning approach.
