Questions:

- What are the similarities and differences between the Catholic resistance to capitalist modernization in the early 20th century and the Islamic resistance to capitalist modernization in the early 21st century?
- In what ways is the definition of terrorism political?
- What state interests can be served by amplifying the risk of terrorism?
- Is the war on terror also a war on legitimate dissent? Does anti-terror legislation go too far in revoking democratic rights?
