COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to introduce students to research in the field of Economics. This is a team-taught course, with each instructor presenting material related to his or her areas of research expertise. Students will also be exposed to research done at other institutions through several visiting speakers. Students are required to actively participate in the lectures and seminars. Each faculty member will design their own assignment which students must fulfill for completion of the course.

Objectives and Learning Outcomes:

- (1) To expose students to current research in Economics
- (2) To introduce students to the research process, and help them acquire the skills necessary to complete an independent research project
- (3) To help students prepare for further study of Economics at the graduate level
